PSC Announces 2020 Energy Statistics Book

41st edition of the publication

MADISON—Today the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) announced the publication of the 2020 Energy Statistics Book. The 41st edition of the publication is produced by the state's energy office, the Office of Energy Innovation, at the PSC. The Statistics Book provides a snapshot of energy use, intensity, economic, and environmental impacts for the years 2015 through 2017.

"Last year, Governor Evers signed Executive Order #38 and put the state on a path to achieve the goal of all electricity consumed in Wisconsin to be 100% carbon-free by 2050. This data is a valuable resource for public officials and decision makers, and it will provide a sound foundation for advocates, researchers, and innovators to help us achieve that goal," said PSC Commissioner Tyler Huebner.

In the future, the PSC will make more datasets available online and updated data will be added more frequently. The PSC is asking that stakeholders provide feedback and suggestions as more Wisconsin energy data is added to the website.

About the 2020 Energy Statistics Book

- In this publication, there are now two distinct chapters highlighting the state economic profile and the environmental impact of all energy use in the state.
- In 2017, energy sector jobs in Wisconsin contributed almost 5% of the total employment in the state, the largest percentage being energy efficiency jobs at 62,289.
- The data depicts all energy used, from petroleum for transportation to renewables and natural gas for electricity generation in Wisconsin.
- This year marks the last year the book will be available as a printed document. Future statistics books and data will be available on the PSC's website, <https://psc.wi.gov>.

The Wisconsin Energy Statistics Book is an annual publication from the PSC that serves as a comprehensive source of data on energy consumption, generation, prices, expenditures, and renewable energy development in Wisconsin.
